Eddy Merckx (1945-Now)

One of the greatest sportsmen of his generation, a cyclist born in a war ravaged Belgium he mastered all aspects of the bike and he is widely acknowledged as the best cyclist in history.

He most likely would have had many more victories had he not been involved in a crash at the back end of the 1969 season, where one person died, and Eddy himself was knocked unconscious with a badly injured pelvis. Yet the next season he was back fighting but had to retire in 1972 at the age of 32 he still is one of the greatest of all time.
